Mentors are trusted counsellors or guides who can be helpful in so many ways. Student mentoring is an integral part of a college. For the effective implementation of this programme, the teachers are assigned with students from their departments at an average ratio of 1:19. The mentors meet their mentees regularly during activity hours and form a bound between the students. They perform academic evaluation of the students and guide them accordingly. Needy students are directed to the college counselling cell. Teachers meet the student's parents once in a year. Week students are identified and are directed to the remedial coaching session/student support programme in the college. Along with department mentoring sessions, students with good academic skills are guided through the Walk With a Scholar programme of the state government. Students are getting professional internal and external mentoring sessions through this programme.

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#### 2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

Continuous Internal Evaluation has a major role in semester based education. Students performance in choice based credit system is evaluated on various parameter. Class tests are conducted regularly by the teachers. Internal and Model exams are conducted for each class. Dates for the same are informed through the academic calendar prepared at the beginning of the year. Retests are conducted for those students who are unable to attend the exams due to valid reasons like sickness, NCC, NSS, sports and other activities. Assignments on each paper are given to students and encourage them for online submission. Seminars on various topics are also evaluated on CIE. Project presentations, viva voce and quiz are also the part of continuous evaluation. Attendance is given due weightage in internal evaluation as per university rules. Lab papers are evaluated based on rough records, student involvement etc...
