script

- ▶ A script is a document that comprises setting, characters, dialogue, and stage directions for movies, TV shows, and stage plays. When directors stage such productions, they follow the instructions provided by the script. In live theatre, script writers are playwrights, and the scripts are also known as playscripts. In film and television, script writers are called screenwriters. A film script is called a screenplay, and a TV script is called a teleplay.
- ► The script starts the artistic process for a dramatic performance, but film, TV, and theatre are all inherently collaborative. Directors, actors, and designers interpret the script. Sometimes these professionals uncover new insight about the material that the original screenwriter may have never imagined during the scriptwriting-process. While a great script forms the foundation of a great performance, it is not the only factor in the artistic process.


CASTING

- ► Casting is the selection of actors who will play various characters in the film. Some are written for specific actors, while others are not. The **casting director** can significantly impact a film's final success or failure. **Casting is a pre-production** process that selects actors, dancers, singers, or other roles required for the **script**, **screenplay**, or teleplay. The casting process becomes an integral part of filmmaking, documentaries, television programs and advertisements, **music videos**, etc., deciding the art's impact on the audience.
- Casting is one of the most critical factors of filmmaking since it influences how audiences and critics view a film. It is the process of identifying the actors who can most effectively and convincingly step into the role. After all, actors are the ones that bring the script and concept to life, but choosing the wrong actor might render some parts untrustworthy, negatively affecting movies.

scene heading?

- ▶ Before diving into the components of how to write a scene heading in a script let's first establish the difference between a slugline and scene heading. Both slug lines and scene headings are written in all capital letters.
- ▶ A <u>slug line</u> is a line within a screenplay written in all uppercase letters to draw attention to specific script information. Therefore, a scene heading is a type of slugline. This image gives a quick run-through of <u>proper</u> <u>screenplay formatting</u>.





SCENE HEADING

One line description of the location and time of day

ACTION -----

The description of the actions in a scene

CHARACTER -----

Identifies the character who is speaking

DIALOGUE

The lines of speech your character says

INTERCUT

Instructions when cutting to multiple locations

SUBHEADER

Used when there are minor changes in a location

EXT. SUBURBAN HOME - NIGHT

WE OPEN on a modern suburban home. The front window illuminated by the lights inside. We see the silhouette of a small human figure as it runs back and forth. We push in closer as we slowly see a BOY running around the house.

- ▶ WHAT IS A SYNOPSIS? A synopsis is a write-up that describes the plot and world of your story. A script synopsis can be used to sell your idea. A synopsis can also be written when providing screenplay coverage or script analysis to agents, managers, and producers.
- As a writer, being able to write a movie synopsis (or one for your TV pilot) is a critical skill. Producers, execs, and agents will often want to read a synopsis before diving into the actual script. And frequently it's the brief synopsis that convinces them to read your script in the first place.

What Is a Cutaway Shot?

- Cutaway shots are a common occurrence in films, TV shows, and even video games.
- They're often used to show the emotional state of a character or to highlight an important object.
- ► The term cutaway shot is usually applied when the camera switches from one scene and cuts away to another that has little relevance to the previous scene.
- Cutaways can be done as brief flashbacks into past events or they may include scenes with other characters who have not been included in the main storyline so far.

- A cutaway shot is a camera technique that provides the audience with an important piece of information, often outside of the main action.
- Cutaway shots are a great way to show the audience what is happening elsewhere, or provide an alternate perspective.
- They can also be used as a transition between scenes. However, if you're not careful with your use of cutaways, they can disrupt the flow of your video.
- What are some considerations for when to best use them?
- The perfect time to use a cutaway shot is when the main subject of your video has nothing more to say, a cutaway can help keep viewers engaged in the video and provide a transition between scenes.
- Cutaways are also used with other types of media, such as still photography or live theater performances.
- In all cases, it's important to think about what you want the audience to take away from the scene that follows- after all, they don't know what will happen next!

- ▶ **Film rushes,** sometimes called daily rushes or just dailies, are the raw, unedited visual and sound footage files from the day's shoot. They represent one of the many moving parts that takes place during a busy shooting day. And they're incredibly important.
- ▶ At the end of the shoot day, rushes are prepared for easy viewing by the cast, and crew. Especially the director, editors and anyone particularly interested in seeing how the day's shoot panned out. And whether there are any shots that will require retakes.
- Preparing rushes generally involves converting the footage into DVD. Or similar format so that it can be easily reviewed. The sound and visual footage may also need to be synced before delivery back to the desired team members for review.
- ▶ Rushes are actually incredibly important. Because they provide near immediate insight into the productivity of the shoot day. Offering a glimpse into footage to help the Director determine whether or not retakes will be necessary. Why are they in such a rush?
- ▶ Because time is money on the set. And many of the cast and crew will only be scheduled to be on set for a day, or a couple of days. Determining the need for retakes quickly can help to ensure those required for the retake are still available on the set.

▶ **Satyajit Ray** (born May 2, 1921, <u>Calcutta</u> [now Kolkata], India—died April 23, 1992, Calcutta) <u>Bengali</u> motion-picture director, writer, and illustrator who brought the Indian <u>cinema</u> to world recognition with *Pather Panchali* (1955; *The Song of the Road*) and its two sequels, known as the Apu Trilogy. As a director, Ray was noted for his <u>humanism</u>, his versatility, and his detailed control over his films and their music. He was one of the greatest filmmakers of the 20th century.

- **▶** What is a melodrama?
- ▶ **Melodrama** is a dramatic work in which events, plot, and characters are sensationalized to elicit strong emotional reactions from the audience. In literature, theatre, and cinema, Melodramas are focused on exaggerated plots rather than characterization. Melodrama characters are often given stereotypical roles. Conflicts are often sensationalized for exaggerated character emotions and performances.
- ▶ The term "melodrama" originated from a combination of the Greek *melos* meaning "melody" or "song" and the French word *drame* meaning "drama." Melodramas were originally theatrical stage plays combining music and dialogue.
- ▶ They were especially popular during the Victorian Era. Since then, Melodramas in television, film, and theatre have steered away from music and focused on sensationalized, highly emotional stories.
- Characteristics of a Melodrama:
- Stereotypical characters
- Exaggerated conflicts
- Sensationalized plots
- Highly emotional

- **▶** What is B-roll footage?
- ▶ **B-roll footage, Broll or B roll** is any supplemental video that considered to be secondary to your primary footage. B-roll can be gathered with a separate unit, acquired from stock footage, or obtained from any source other than your principal photography.
- ► The term for A-roll vs B-roll originated in the earliest days of Hollywood moviemaking, when principal footage was termed A-roll. An identical roll of film, the B-roll, or B-reel, was used for filler and transitional cuts.
- What is B-roll footage?
- May be shot by second unit crews.
- May be pulled from stock footage libraries.
- May not require sound.
- Provides supporting imagery and cutaway shots.
- Can also be used for establishing shots.

What is storyboad

- ▶ A **storyboard** is a visual representation of a film sequence and breaks down the action into individual panels. It is a series of ordered drawings, with camera direction, dialogue, or other pertinent details. It sketches out how a video will unfold, shot by shot.
- ▶ It's is similar to a trial-run for your finished film, video, or commercial, laid out in a comic book-like form.
- Drawings, sketches, reference images or photographs to represent each frame.
- A description of the shot any relevant information on the action, dialogue, or composition.
- Shot specs shot size, lens length, two-shot, etc.
- Arrows to indicate camera and/or character movement or how each shot connects to the next.

Storyboards help to bring a writer's work to life, providing an artistic visual reference for the cast and crew. They can be essential for capturing the essence of a scene and helping it to jump off the paper.
